

Helvetia's Premier Soils

- All soils worldwide are classified by capability
- Range from Class I (BEST) to Class 8 (WORST)
- An area will rarely have all one type - usually a %
- Helvetia has rare high concentration of Class 1 -28%



Why are Helvetia soils so productive?

It Started in the Last Ice Age

- Periodic sudden ruptures of the ice dam on the Clark Fork River that created Glacial Lake Missoula in Montana.
- Evidence of at least 25 massive floods between 13,000 and 15,000 years ago.

Missoula Flood Path


- After each ice dam rupture, waters rushed down the Clark Fort (ID)
 & the Columbia River (OR)
- Flood waters scoured much of Eastern Washington and Oregon's Willamette Valley

What Washington State lost...


 Missoula Floods carried away eastern Washington's Class 1 and 2 soil, leaving "scablands"

What are the benefits of Helvetia's Class 1 & 2 Soils?

- Excellent tilth (suitability for sowing seeds)
- Excellent water retention
- Higher yields per acre
- Diverse crops


What is "hydrology"?

Helvetia's four creeks are part of the Dairy-McKay sub-watershed which drains into the Tualatin River Watershed:



Helvetia's Topography


- Gentle, south-facing slopes
- Rain water drains southward from the Tualatin Mountains

Helvetia's Field Tiling


- Farmers have installed subsurface drainage system over past 80 years
- Originally clay tubes now perforated plastic
- Significant capital investment
- Interconnected system crosses property lines

The Benefits of Field Tiling

- Effective way to drain thousands of upland acres
- Reduces "wet feet" for crops
- Eliminates flooding
- Optimizes crop production

How Do Helvetia Farmers Practice Sustainability?

- Conserve water resources
- No irrigation less energy inputs - smaller carbon footprint
- Rotate crops
- Plant cover crops to restore nutrients to soil





Helvetia's Sustainable Farms

- Helvetia farmers have
 been productive over 150
 years
- Over 40 farming families make their living solely by farming (5,000 acres)
- Six Century Farms within
 2 miles:, Batchelder,
 Bishop, Gates, Guerber,
 Pieren, Yungen

Helvetia's Sustainability = Nature + Nurture

- Class 1 and 2 soils, nutrient-rich topsoil
- South-facing slopes, enabling earlier crop ripening, drainage
- Ample natural water

 Sustainable, creative soil management: Integrated drainage system (field tiling) Crop rotation Cover crops

Sustainability Example: Helvetia Hazelnuts


- Orchards planted in 1940's, still producing after 70 years
- Replanting with new OSU variety to avoid blight
- Hazelnuts take 16 years to mature
- Will continue producing for 150 years

Sustainability Example: Diverse Crops

- Crop rotation: clover, wheat, grass seed, hay
- Use natural rainwater
- Plant cover crops
- Channel excess water underground
- Productive for over 100 years

Sustainability Example: Local Foods

- CSA's (Community Supported Agriculture) offer subscriptions
- Membership fee allows farmers to pre-plan crops
- Fresh fruit & vegetables provided all year round
- Members know how their food is grown



Helvetia's Natural Resources

- 100+ herd of Roosevelt elk use Helvetia as habitat
- Depend upon Helvetia for food, forage, shelter and calving
- Range up to 50 miles a day
- From Forest Park to Coast Mountains



Conflict with humans

More fencing and more traffic reduce habitat; leads to stress and failure to thrive. Foraging on cover crops causes farmers to lose soil nutrients.

Helvetia's native Oregon White Oak trees

- Some as old as 500 years, most about 250 years old, about 5,000 in Helvetia
- Less than 1% of historic
 Willamette Valley native
 oak habitats still exist
- Metro regards Oregon white oak savannas and woodlands as "habitats of concern"



Habitat Conversion

Biggest threat to Oregon white oaks is conversion to urban uses, leads to island habitats, unsuitable habitat

White-Breasted Nuthatch (Sitta carolinensis aculeata)


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These species depend upon Oregon white oak for habitat (survival). Population/habitat threatened.

Vulnerable Species

Helvetia's Red-Legged Frogs

- State listed as sensitive species (population in decline)
- Disburse over wide territory
- Need room to "breathe"
- Threatened by development, loss of habitat



Atfalati (Tuality) People

Atfalati nurtured Helvetia's natural resources


- Nurtured growth of Oregon white oak - 3 generations for acorns
- Ground up acorns from
 Oregon white oaks for
 mush
- Revered the feathers from the Acorn Woodpecker and elk teeth

Atfalati left imprint in Helvetia

- Thousands of artifacts found in Helvetia (Boehler, VanDomelen collections)
- Farmers: Best time to find artifacts - plow after rain
- Decimated by disease
- Atfalati forced to join
 Confederated Tribes of
 Grand Ronde in 1855

Atfalati heritage interpreted

- Atfalati heritage is maintained by CTGR (Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde)
- CTGR co-sponsors annual Helvetia Culture Fest
- Perform traditional tribal songs and demonstrate crafts, interpret artifacts

Pioneers Homestead in Helvetia - 1840's

- West Union School established in 1851
- West Union Baptist Church founded by David Lenox in 1844, Captain of 1st wagon train to cross Rockies. National Register of Historic Places
- Chambers house (1865)

Swiss discover Helvetia, Oregon - 1870's

- Swiss immigrants arrived in several migrations between 1870's to 1890's.
- In 1892, they coined the name "Helvetia", meaning "Switzerland" in Latin.
- Helvetia Community Church built in 1899



19-year-old Fred Bischoff (Bishop) built barns and homes throughout Helvetia in the late 1800's. Barns built WITHOUT nails (morter & tenon) and still in use today.

So, everything's good in Helvetia, right?



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Helvetia faces constant threats

- Over the past 30 years, Helvetia has been coveted for *industrial* uses incompatible with agriculture and natural resources.
- Helvetia land is near the freeway, flat and has plentiful water developers, city, county see more \$\$.

Helvetia land is at risk

* 1970's - County DUMP SITE threatened Jackson Falls - private citizens bought the Falls to protect it.

 Iquition 1980's - State wanted four sites for LANDFILLS threatened water quality - citizens banded together as "Helvetia-Mountaindale Coalition" to oppose. Citizens won.

Helvetia Land is at risk

- Iggo's State planned to build two PRISONS on agricultural land near Groveland Road. Farmers form "Tualatin Lands Coalition" to defeat proposal.
- * 1990's Private company planned to ship SHEEP
 CARCASSES from New Zealand to bury on Helvetia farmland across from West Union Elementary School. Citizens defeat proposal.

Citizens say okay to jobs

- City of Hillsboro lobbies Metro for 1200 acres of Helvetia farmland south of West Union Road for jobs.
 Intel promises to bring in 700 R&D high paying jobs.
 Includes Liberty High School site. Citizens approve new UGB (Urban Growth Expansion) on *promise of jobs*.
- 2004 present. Farmers sell out to speculators. Some development occurs in new UGB. Intel does not build. Hundreds of acres left for weeds.

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Citizens say "NO" to giving up more Helvetia farmland

- City of Hillsboro and Washington County target
 7,000 acres of Helvetia farmland for Urban Reserves
 for warehouses/distribution centers and medium density
 housing
- * 2009 to 2013 Save Helvetia supporters testify in opposition at more than 50 hearings before Washington County Board of Commissioners, Metro, Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC/ Salem). Urban acres reduced to 800 in Helvetia, with 673 acres west of NW Helvetia Road in best Helvetia farmland.

The "best of the best" Helvetia land still in jeopardy

- 2012 Urban Reserves not finalized yet City of Hillsboro requests 440 acres of Helvetia land for UGB expansion from Metro. Denied after opposition from Save Helvetia supporters.
- 2013 9 groups file appeals with the Court of Appeals about Reserves process.



Two-pronged approach to protect Helvetia


- Challenge UGB *industrial* expansions onto Helvetia farmland.




